How does the plan address our agency, team, or partnership's health equity goals? 1

How will we ensure selected strategies build on one another to form a comprehensive approach that advances the achievement of health equity in your community? 1

Who is accountable for reaching the short term and long-term goals? 3 What provisions can we include to monitor progress and reach?

Is the work adequately resourced? Is the work and timeline realistic, adequately supported? How will sustainability of the intervention be addressed? 3

Advancing Health Equity





Are there provisions to ensure ongoing data collection, public reporting, community participation and public accountability? What are the oversight entities, and how are affected communities formally represented? Who are the decision makers and has that been clearly communicated with the community? 4,5

What processes can be established to identify and remove barriers to implementation? 1

How can we work with partners to anticipate needs among populations experiencing health inequities and provide necessary supports to advance equitable outcomes?

What methods have we put in place to monitor progress in implementation, identify issues early in the process, and assess how well populations experiencing health inequities are being reached? 1
